From our Minister

“For we are taking pains to do what is right, not only in the eyes of the Lord but also in the eyes of men”

2 Corinthians 8:21

This verse from Paul’s second letter to Corinth speaks loudly to me of Lent. As human beings we are all flawed and as followers of Christ we are all called to seek holiness. When we use Lent wisely, we come before the God that loves us with a willingness to do what is right and a desire to allow God to make changes in us.

We only have to look at the world of politics to see that the world is crying out for honesty and authenticity amidst a culture that feels it has been let down by previous generations. There are many who feel that they have to wear a mask just to fit in or be accepted by others. But those masks often hide deep wounds and therefore hide our own authenticity.

I remember reading a wonderful Lent book a few years ago entitled “Our Sound Is Our Wound” by Lucy Winkett. In this book the author states that “The sounds, noise and music with which we are surrounded in modern life have spiritual implications”. The book looks at how we listen for the voice of God within these soundscapes. Some of the sounds that surround us are beautiful and harmonious but others are sharp, hideous and cutting.

Our wounds (and we all have them) are an important part of who we are and we are assured in the Bible that God is aware of every one of them from the tiniest nick to the gaping wounds that refuse to heal.

As we travel towards Easter, we keep our focus on Christ crucified. Jesus’ wounds are not hidden but exposed. What we see on the cross is brutal honesty and an authenticity that speaks volumes about our need for redemption. Christ’s wounds are born out of pure love and I believe there is a beauty in their transparency.

In Christ’s agony, we see our own brokenness and vulnerability but this is countered by God’s voice which says “by his wounds we were healed” (Isaiah 53:5).

John Donne who was a 17th Century priest and poet says “The scriptures are God’s voice, the church is His echo”. It is in God’s love that we find rest from a noisy world.

As we travel towards another glorious Easter, I urge you to come before the cross as you are because without wounds we would not be capable of compassion. Through our wounds we find our voice and it is that voice which a hurting world needs to hear. The authentic voice that says:-


“Amazing grace – how sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me!

This picture of The Last Supper was painted as a mural on a plaster wall by Leonardo da Vinci between 1495 and 1498 and considered to be the most important and beautiful mural painting in the world. It has been the subject of many restorations and repair. The extract from the painting shown on the cover is an enhanced copy and likely to be more as it originally looked. The copy below shows the locations of the disciples. The figure to the right of Jesus is John not Mary Magdalene as suggested by Dan Brown in his book “The Da Vinci Code”! There are many other tasks Gwen does quietly and unseen, including making sure there are flowers on display on Sundays and watering them during the week if necessary, and bundling numerous copies of 'Rejoice' and distributing them.

There have been many tributes to Gwen from the community she has served together with Ray for over 60 years, and from her friends at Duke Street.

Although modestly Gwen says she feels the award is on behalf of other people who have helped her, she richly deserves this accolade as she continues to work for the benefit of everyone, and we acknowledge and appreciate all that she does.

Gwen will be presented with her medal by His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of Devon at an investiture in May.

The 16th December saw the funeral of Maureen Watts, a loyal member at Duke Street. The service was conducted by Rev Anna Flindell. There were moving tributes from her two nieces, and from Gwen Kingdon on behalf of the Church.

Sunday 14th January – The Annual Covenant Service including Holy Communion, conducted by Rev Anna Flindell, was a reminder and renewal of our dedication to God. The same moving service was shared in all churches.




World Day of Prayer


