

Sadly, this was probably the last concert to be held in that magnificent building due to the closure of the Bideford Methodist Church.

The third concert was at Bishops Nympton Village Hall on 20th June. In contrast to the weather at Bideford, this evening was one of extreme heat. Despite that, the concert was a great success. A review of Bear Grylls Book

As I read through this book, it was almost as if each of the 'witnesses' (Mary, Thomas, Simon, John and Mary Magdalene) was speaking to me personally.

Bear Grylls is one of the most famous adventurers in the world. A former SAS Trooper, Chief Scout to some fifty million Scouts for fifteen years, and fronts some of the most watched TV shows.

The First Occupant of Wesley House.

Rev. George Bolderston, Wesleyan Minister (1853-1911) became the first occupant of Wesley House, the new Manse, in 1909.

As a youngster, George was engaged in Sunday School work and took up lay preaching at the age of 18. In 1874 he was accepted as a candidate for the ministry and was sent to Glasgow, before training for two years at Didsbury College during the time that William Burt Pope (a notable Wesleyan Theologian) was Theological Tutor. His first ministerial appointment was to Helston, at the tip of Cornwall in 1877, with subsequent service including St Austell (1879), Dartmouth (1881), St Columb (1882), and Gwennap (1884).

In 1909 he became Superintendent Minister in the South Molton Circuit in Devon where he was the first occupant of Wesley House, the new manse. The family home was shared with his wife, Sarah Mary, and their son and two daughters.

Though only 57 years old, in the early months of 1911, George apparently had not been in robust health, but then, unexpectedly and suddenly, he was taken ill while conducting a service at Brayford Chapel on March 7th. Despite medical care, he grew weaker and died on the morning of 22nd March. The funeral service was attended by a large number of people and several local ministers including the Vicar and the Baptist Pastor. Besides his widow and children, his brother from Felixstowe and other family members were present. Wreaths included tributes from both Men's and Women's Bible Classes which perhaps points to George's ministerial priorities. Interment was at South Molton cemetery. (His widow would subsequently be laid to rest in the same plot).

George's early life.

George Bolderston was born on 26/4/1853 at Woolstanwood near Crewe, in Cheshire. He was the fifth child of John, who was a farmer, and his wife Ann, the couple had at least 11 children including Elizabeth, the great grandmother of the person who researched and wrote this account of George's life, while on holiday in Devon in 2016 prior to the Covid outbreak.

George's father joined the Wesleyan Methodists as a result of hearing a sermon in Nantwich Wesleyan Chapel from Rev. Thomas Stokoe. It was said that 'from that day his religious life became a powerful reality' and he was subsequently a Methodist class leader for 25 years. Preaching and class meetings took place at the farm until a chapel was built in 1890. George's father also served for many years as a Poor Law Guardian and Chairman of the Nantwich Highways Board, and as a business man 'his reputation was unstained and deservedly high'.

In relation to his upbringing, George's obituary states 'His early conversation to God was the result of the godly training of his Methodist home'.

George Bolderston the Man.

What sort of person was George? An obituary read, 'In all his circuits he left a record of faithful service. Modest and retiring disposition, he possessed a cultivated mind and a warm and loving heart. His preaching was thoroughly evangelical and accompanied by a quiet fervour that betokened a life in close fellowship with Christ. He was a devoted pastor, a wise and capable administrator, endearing himself by his courtesy and

sympathy to the people amongst whom he laboured'. (North Devon Journal 23/3/1911), Another stated 'he was of a kindly but retiring disposition, and was esteemed most by those who knew him best'. A tribute subsequently placed in the South Molton Chapel remains to this day, (see the plaque on the wall near the vestry doorway), it includes the scriptural quote,

'The memory of the just is blessed'.'

This account of the life of his great great grandmother's uncle, was researched by Robert Proudlove, Kirkwall, while on holiday in Devon in 2016, he sent it to Derek in July 2020, with acknowledgements to

Back in May we held a special VE Day 80th anniversary church service. This included memories from older members of the congregation of VE Day in 1945. We recalled how relief and celebration at the end of hostilities in Europe, were mingled with sadness over lost lives and damaged homes. This service was

followed by a wartime-themed buffet where two of the older residents of the village cut a special VE Day celebration cake.

In June we joined with groups from across the country to host 'The Big Lunch'. This is the UK's annual get-together for neighbours and communities with 10 million taking part this year for a time of friendship, food and fun. The weather was kind so it was held on the church patio next to the car park. Over 70 adults and children including several non-church goers met together for a BBQ, have their face painted, play on a bouncy castle, chat and make new friends.

The visit of Rev Paul Smith on Sunday 29th June was very memorable. He spoke passionately about the 'when the Holy Spirit comes...' Referring to Acts 2:42-47, he highlighted the hallmarks of the first Christians who; devoted themselves to the apostles teaching, had a common purse, shared in real fellowship, were filled with awe, and grew as the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved. The chapel was nearly full as friends from throughout the circuit joined us and then stayed for a bring and share lunch afterwards.

As part of our 2025 Mission strategy we hold monthly outdoor church services during the warmer months and are also using the church field more. In July we invited the local community to a free brunch

and short service. Over 50 attended, afterwards children enjoyed an insect safari exploring along paths mowed between high grass to spot butterflies, grasshoppers, ladybirds and other bugs.

Each week we post on Facebook to promote upcoming services and events. Over 250 different people regularly view posts on the North Molton Methodist Church Facebook page and we also post on the village Facebook noticeboard.

A "VOICE" FROM THE PAST

Quite by chance, whilst recently studying *The Book* of *Revelation* with my Home Group, I happened to look at another book, long in my possession, on the "Gravestones in South Molton Churchyard" compiled by the late John Parsons for South Molton & District Archive and later indexed by the late David Ryall before his death in 2008. I happened across an entrywhich I must have read several times before- but this time it really made an impact.

The tombstone contained a verse from Revelation Ch.14.v;13 -

Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth. Yea, saith the spirit, that they may rest their labours and their works do follow them.

My own Bible being the NIV version-slightly different words-I had to turn to the King James' Bible belonging to my Granny, Elizabeth J. Beer- a member of the South Molton Methodist Church-who died in 1954 when I was 14, my Mum subsequently brought her Bible home for me.

This quotation was on the tombstone of William Nutt who died on 16th October 1945, aged 62 years. It informs us that William-was a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Society of this Town 34 years.

William Nutt therefore was born in 1783 and joined the Wesleyans in 1811-just four years after Methodism arrived in South Molton. He must have attended the "Rookery Chapel" – a converted barn in East Street-before a chapel was built here in 1821- to be replaced by our present building of the 1880s.

His grave is on the North side of the Churchyard- just a few steps in from the car park, but if you go to see it be careful because it is on the edge of a steep drop.

Connexionalism

The concept of Christina Unity was always a hot agenda item. It was established in 1908 by two clergyman, one American and one British originally as a prayer week. Opinions vary as to its exact aims and value. What is has done is to help Christians realise that all the mainstream Churches have a core set of doctrines in which we all believe. What a surprise!! These core beliefs are enshrined in the Nicene Creed, which we have all recited and is in all the service books of all mainstream Churches.

What is different between the denominations is the organisation of the Churches, how worship is conducted and the ordination of the clergy It is not the purpose of this little item to dwell on this but take the two extremes of say the Catholic Church and a Bible-Christian Chapel and the difference is more than obvious.

During the preparation of Rejoice magazines I end up reading most articles as I put them into their placet, which enables me, for instance, to put photos in the appropriate place in the text!

In preparing this edition one theme has stood out me, that of the Connexional nature of Methodism - a real gift that John Wesley left us with which has stood the test of time. but how may of us relaise how important it is and how it is a major feature of the Church. But, what does it mean?

I started to write a definition but found an online version which summarises it very well and is far more eloquent than I could have written. So here is it is.......

Connexionalism, in the Methodist Church, is a system of church governance that emphasizes the interconnectedness and interdependence of its various parts. It's a way of relating where individuals and groups (local churches, circuits, districts, etc.) are not isolated but exist with and for each other, sharing resources and responsibilities. This principle highlights the importance of mutual support, shared mission, and the understanding that no local church is entirely self-sufficient.

What wonderful words and what a beautiful concept Several things have come together in my mind recently.

Firstly, one of the main features in this edition is that of Wesley House. The Circuit Property Committee spent many hours discussing possible future uses for this building but none seemed to fit the situation perfectly and costs became well out of our range. Now we have a solution! Part of

it will be accommodation at some time in the future benefiting the circuit as a whole from rent Then the need for some circuit storage, a circuit office has been met But most of all to our brothers and sisters in South Molton who have struggled with providing an outstanding witness in the community for many years without adequate facilities, mainly storage I am sure I speak for all of us when I say how pleased we are that they now have the storage and other facilities which will, I am sure, benefit their ongoing work for God

Secondly, I was struck by Shirley's comments toward the end her article from Burrington in which she referred back to the days when churches supported each other directly a lot more than now and alongside tthe Methodist Guild – even with twenty plus chapels in the circuit at that time..

Thirdly, the reintroduced dates list with this edition of Rejoice also fits this theme as it gives us a chance to be more aware of what is on and support other churches when and where we can.

Fourthly, and on a slightly different theme, at a recent circuit meeting Kings Nympton requested some money to help them complete the building work on their windows. They were in a difficult situation in that they couldn't use that part of the premises to raise the money but didn't have the money to repair the windows. They are one of our smallest chapels have a limited congregation but have a strong witness in the community and are well respected After brief discussion it was agreed to give them the necessary money. Perfect connexionalism – long may it last,

And a final comment which emphasises even more the supreme importance of connexionalism.

At the ordination of a Minister in the Methodist Church in Great Britain ordination is linked inseparably with 'Reception into Full Connexion'. The Methodist Conference receives into Full Connexion with itself those who are called to exercise an ordained ministry specifically through the Methodist Church. When they are received into Full Connexion ministers (both presbyters and deacons) enter a covenant relationship with the Conference.

Thanks for reading this, I hope you found it interesting.

Children and Young Families Support Worker at South Molton

What a fantastic academic year, and especially final quarter it has been. I can't believe how quickly the time has passed!

Of course, Teddy Bears groups went out as usual with a celebratory bang... parties, parties, parties. Roll on September so that we can start all over again! Although of course we want to make the most of the summertime... and we have started with' On Your Marks, our 2025 holiday club!

We have been delighted that so many children were signed up to take part: **58** in total, which was pretty much maximum capacity! And, we were even more delighted that so many children actually turned up on the days: **56** in total. The youngest of them were *almost* 5 years old, and the eldest were *almost* 12 years old. Although of course' not *all* children were in attendance *every day*... we simply couldn't have accommodated that within our hall space.

To offer a clearer picture, due to days out and family holidays; there were **30** children with us on day one, **29** on day two, a bumper **38** on day 3 and **28** on day 4, which was awesome! Our maximum capacity for any one day was *ideally* **36**. And of course, with that many children comes an army of volunteers... in fact **16** of them (across all four days), broken down as follows; 2 group leaders and 3 or 4 additional helpers each day' caring for and supporting each of the three 'village' groups that the children were split up into. **Thank God** for each and every single volunteer, including those from our own church and those that came to us from the Baptist Church to help; as without so many, we couldn't have ensured that our 'age related' adult to child ratios were met' in order to keep all of the children safely engaged with the variety of activities undertaken.

And what activities did take place? you might may well ask...

Well, each day began with a getting to know each other session, referred to as 'starting blocks', whereby within their village groups the children; built and decorated structures out of cardboard boxes, made name badges and team torches, and were focused by their team leaders on questions designed to help them learn about each other. They were also

given sporting facts to remember (that were changed daily), in order to earn themselves medals; which were

totalled up at the end of each day to determine which 'village' were declared *the winning team*.

Myself and the volunteers were amazed at how competitive it became amongst the teams, as the children all worked really hard with their eyes firmly set on the prize: the coveted trophy.

Once out of their starting blocks, all teams were drawn together as one' within 'the stadium' zone, in the middle of the hall, whereby all' inclusive of volunteers, took part in an aerobics session. After that the children played games and undertook challenges, which were linked to the sport for the day. These of course resulted in earning more medals, to be included in their accumulating daily totals!

After that, each day the children were treated to a different puppet show, which shared a story from the bible, followed by a commentary to help focus their thoughts and considerations on what the puppets had shared with them. Then it was time for the children (and the volunteers) to take some well-earned rest, with quiet(er) time, refreshments and a team discussion back in their villages.

Refreshments over, the teams were called back together again as one, within the stadium zone' for more physical exercises and mental challenges, and to let off steam with the holiday club theme song and dance.

Each day ended with a performance of *Ready Steady Enders Street*: a drama set at the GETFIT leisure centre, which was performed by some of the leaders from each of the villages. Each day's performance focused on the characters working hard to overcome adversity' and show themselves as being a great team, with qualities that would make God proud.

Finally, before being returned to their parents, on the days that weather permitted, the children were taken out into the garden and encouraged to play sporting type games together.

To top things off, we got to celebrate all that had happened at holiday club, on the following Sunday - with Sunday Club' at morning worship. During this time our congregation got to experience some of what had taken place at holiday club, along with some of the families of the children that had taken part in the holiday club program. Here, they too got to celebrate their children and our wonderful volunteers

being awarded with gifts and certificates for taking part, as well as watching 'live performances' of the holiday theme song, a puppet show, and the final episode of the unfolding drama: Ready Steady Enders Street.

I really hope to be able to recreate this wonderful time in the future with more holiday clubs. Here's to praying for it to happen!
