We turn now to our bible readings, which today
focus on the baptism of Jesus, and its significance
for us:

We read: Isaiah 42:1-9

Here is my servant, the one I support. He is the one I
choose, and I am pleased with him. I have put my
Spirit upon him, and he will bring justice to all
nations. He will not shout or cry out or yell or speak
loudly in the streets. A bruised reed he will not
break, and a smoldering wick he will not snuff out...

We read: Matthew 3:13-17

Then Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to be
baptized by John. But John tried to deter him,
saying, “Why do you come to me to be baptized? I
need to be baptized by you!” Jesus replied, “Let it
be so now; it is proper for us to do this to fulfill all
righteousness.”

Then John consented. As soon as Jesus was
baptized, he came up out of the water. At that
moment heaven was opened, and he saw the Spirit
of God descending like a dove and alighting on him.
And a voice from heaven said, “This is my beloved
Son; with him I am well pleased.”

Reflection

The question of whose son Jesus is reverberates
around the early chapters of Matthew's gospel. If
you look, you will see how it starts with the family
history of Jesus. Twenty-eight generations are listed
in all, from Abraham right through to Joseph who is

described as “the husband of Jesus’ mother Mary.” The account then moves on to the story of Joseph, and how he adopted Jesus into his family - and with God’s help protected him as a new-born child.

In these early chapters we hear that Jesus was conceived of the “Spirit” with the purpose of “saving the people from their sins” and how he would fulfill prophecy. Our attention is also drawn to the story of the wise men, and how Jesus was “born to be king.”

Now we fast forward about thirty years. John’s ministry is calling ordinary people to turn back to God and to be ready, for the Messiah was coming – and now here is Jesus the Messiah coming to him, just like everyone else, to be baptized.

John was reluctant. He questioned why Jesus should be baptized. We too may wonder the same thing. Yet Jesus insisted. In doing so, some say he identifies himself as one of us, fully human – and yes, this is important to us. Only by being fully human can he really know our struggles.

As people who have seen how his story unfolds, we know that he will indeed experience fully the limitations of his humanity, enabling him to better understand our frailty. His knowledge of our flawed nature puts him in a unique position to see what it is we need, and walk alongside us wherever we are.

Yet is this the reason Jesus gives? When John asks, Jesus just says that this is how it needs to be – it is what God wants of them in that moment, and that by doing this all righteousness will be fulfilled.

Although John may have questioned what Jesus was asking of him, he agrees to baptize him. I wonder if sometimes we too question what God asks of us, especially when seems to go against our own expectations or inclinations?

...and as Jesus is baptized God’s voice is heard: “This is my beloved Son” says God. So here we have the truth unveiled. Jesus is God’s own Son, who in this moment is both claimed and affirmed by God, his heavenly Father.

God’s words also seem to indicate the path Jesus is to walk, on by referencing the words of Isaiah 42 where we also hear of : “the one I am pleased with.”

For Jesus this is the moment that marks the beginning of his earthly ministry and it is also the beginning of the path he establishes, for us to follow. From it our tradition of baptism is shaped.

However, our traditions are not based on the baptism of John, but on the baptism of Jesus. For us, baptism is a sign that we accept the call to walk in the way of Jesus, to follow him and to put our trust in him. Here, for us, we also see that, right from the beginning “all righteousness” is to be fulfilled.

This righteousness comes to us by way of a gift, just like the promised Holy Spirit. It is a gift that is only possible because Jesus IS the Son of God, and he chose the way of sacrifice – dying our death so that we can be raised up with him.

In being baptized we (or those who bring us for baptism) recognise that Jesus truly is God’s Son, and we commit ourselves, with his help, to follow his ways. Later, where others have made this promise for us, we affirm our own choice to follow him, and it is almost as if we stand with him, in his baptism.

For in an echo of God’s words to Jesus we hear also his words to us – that we too are welcomed as God’s own children and adopted into his family; able to come to him as his sons and daughters.

What a privilege this is, to be able to call the one true God “dad” and hear his words, that say he is pleased with. All this when we commit ourselves to follow and trust in Jesus, seeing him as both the Son of God, and as the source of all our righteousness.

Let us pray:

Living, loving Lord Jesus,
As we remember your baptism, may we remember too our own commitment to believe in and follow you, where-ever that path may lead us.

As we do this, we ask you, Generous God, to touch us again with the fire of your Spirit and to renew us by your grace, as you did at our baptism, so that we may continue to profess the one true faith and live in love and unity with all who follow Christ - Amen.

Today it is also right that we pray for your church, scattered across all the earth. We thank you that you came to be the Saviour of all people and to call

us all to follow you. We also thank you that you continue to call people into your church and ask that you hold us all in your loving protection and care, until the day when you will come again.

Finally we pray for the people we know need our prayers today. For our families and friends, our communities and those whose stories have touched our hearts. We pray for those we know who are lonely, those who are struggling with infirmity and those who need your healing touch today. Come close to them Lord and bless them. Meet them at their points of deepest need, and lead them onto your paths of peace, restoration, healing and hope.

For you come as our Righteousness and our Redeemer – in you alone we put our hope. Amen.
